Manitoba offers a tapestry of flavours to tantalize your taste buds. Add in a dash of adventure and you're sure to work up an appetite! Whether you prefer food cooked over the campfire, hot and fresh out of a wood-fired oven or served in style poolside, there's something for your heart (and stomach) in Manitoba.



1. Nature Retreat, Meet Pizza Night

Indulge in the mouthwatering wood-fired pizzas of Moon Gate Guest House, located on the Whitemouth River. Every Friday, you can either pick up your pizza to-go or savour it on the beautiful grounds, made from scratch using local and organic ingredients. This year, a new menu is being introduced and a screened-in sunset patio is being constructed for an enhanced dining experience. Or extend your stay by immersing yourself in nature while enjoying the cozy accommodations of the guest house.

2. Camping Food = Best Food

Some of the best meals are made over the campfire. If you're still looking for your perfect camping site, consider a private campground!

Private campgrounds often provide a range of amenities such as swimming pools, hot showers, electrical and water hook-ups, and other recreational activities. 3. Explore, Stay And Eat

Lake Metigoshe has become a favoured summer retreat for locals and visitors alike, and at the heart of this community lies Turtle Mountain Resort. The resort's cluster of roadside cabins, adorned with rustic decor and artwork, offers a range of sizes and bedrooms with a fully stocked kitchen and supplied linens. The retreat serves as an ideal home base for exploring the area.

The onsite Velvet Antler Café is a gem of the region, with decked-out burgers, hand-cut kettle chips, and even bannock-infused dishes on the menu. Nearby adventures include the public beach, the town of Boissevain and Turtle Mountain Provincial Park, where you'll find hiking trails and viewing towers.

5. Take Flight In Gimli

If you're planning a day trip to Gimli, Manitoba, you're in for a treat! Try a local delicacy – pickerel – at town-favourite Beach Boy Restaurant, dig into delicious pub food at Ship and Plough, or nosh on a variety of specialty pizzas at Brennivins Pizza Hijs.

Once you've grabbed a bite to eat, explore the fascinating world of aviation history at the Gimli Glider Exhibit. The museum commemorates the famous "Gimli Glider" incident that occurred in 1983, when an Air Canada Boeing 767 ran out of fuel mid-flight and made an emergency landing in Gimli. One of the museum's highlights is the flight simulator, where visitors can experience the thrill of piloting and landing an aircraft firsthand.

The Gimli Glider Exhibit is open Friday, Saturday and Monday from 11 am to 4 pm – Sunday, 12 to 4 pm. Find out more at travelmanitoba.com/flight-pass.

6. Bears, Belugas and Burgers

Headed to the northern town of Churchill this summer? In between paddle boarding with belugas and watching polar bears lounging on the shores, stop in at the Tundra Pub - a popular local haunt known for its tasty dishes, like the Borealis Burger and Vegetarian Curry.

7. Down The River



1. Visiting Aircraft

July 9 - 10: Canso PBY-5A

The Canso played a vital role in Canada's history. It was used as a submarine hunter, and for search and rescue during the war. After the war, it was converted for civilian use, mostly as a water bomber to help fight forest fires – first in Newfoundland and later in western Canada.

Tours available from 12 pm - 8 pm both days!

July 16 - 17: Avo Lancaster

The Mynarski Memorial Lancaster, also nicknamed VeRA, is owned and operated by the Canadian Warplane Heritage Museum – a non-profit charitable museum located in Hamilton, Ontario. The museum's restoration crew, consisting mostly of World War II veterans, painstakingly restored the aircraft over 11 years. This 'Lanc' is the only airworthy one in North America, and one of only two in the world.

Advance tickets required.

August 9 - 11: P-51D Mustang

This aircraft could fly circles around the competition, especially when it came to escorting Allied bombers deep into enemy territory. Originally built for snooping around as a recon plane by the Royal Air Force (RAF), the Mustang got a makeover that turned it into a high-flying, sky-patrolling warrior. The P-51D's ability to switch gears at the drop of a hat made it a go-to asset for the Allied forces.

2. Pedal Planes

Ride the runways! These ride-on toys – ideal for children aged two through six – come in two sizes and a variety of designs, including a Tiger Moth biplane, Starfighter jet, and Canadair Tutor. Pedal planes are available daily from 11 am to 4 pm during July and August. Rides are included with admission.



3. Summer Fun Days

Summer Fun Days programming starts July 2, 2024, and runs every Tuesday morning from 10 am to 12:30 pm through August 20. Each program is $2\frac{1}{2}$ hours long and includes: a museum tour, an educational component, a hands-on STEM activity, a nut-free snack, and supervised playtime outdoors in Aviation Plaza (weather permitting).

There are two programs to choose from, suitable for ages five through 12. Participants can learn about the four forces of flight, design and build their own aircraft, and more!

"Insights on Social Connections": A new path to health and wellness

CJNU, in partnership with the Manitoba Association of Senior Communities (MASC) and Active Aging in Manitoba (AAIM), is excited to continue with our brand-new series "Insights on Social Connections." The program airs during the last week of each month, and features host Jim Feeney, who is joined by co-hosts Connie Newman (MASC) and Linda Brown (AAIM). The next program will air on Wednesday, July 31, from noon to 1 pm.

Every month, they will be discussing the unique aspects of social prescribing - the medical term for connecting patients with non-clinical services in the community. Dr. Michael Routledge, who was featured on the May 29th program launch, sees social prescribing as a valuable tool that can aid

family physicians in connecting their patients to the senior resource coordinators/finders in their local community.

Each program will feature a guest who contributes to fostering community social connections for older Manitobans. We will explore program options in Winnipeg and rural Manitoba, and hear first-hand some of the benefits individuals gain from being active and socially connected.

The goal of "Insights on Social Connections" is to reduce social isolation for older adults by providing information to listeners about the resources in the community and how they can connect. We want to help people experience for themselves the power and health benefits of social connections.

23 Year-Old Announcer Calls The Shots!

On January the 17th, CJNU listeners heard the debut of 23-year-old Trevor Curl as he hosted the Goldeyes "Inside Pitch" show on CJNU. For Trevor, as for many of us, radio and baseball are synonymous. And, despite his youth, Trevor has a deep background in baseball – from playing catch with his dad after supper, to T-Ball, to college baseball.

He was an avid listener of longtime Seattle Mariner playby-play announcer Rick Rizzs. Trevor liked the way Rizzs painted a picture of games in listeners' minds. This, coupled with him attending games at T-Mobile Park to watch Mariner greats Felix Hernandez, Ichiro Suzuki and Ken Griffey Jr., cemented Trevor's dreams of becoming a play-byplay announcer.

While playing infield for the Eastern Oregon Mountaineers, Trevor graduated with a communications degree. He broadcast in North Carolina in 2022 with the Old North State League, and, in 2023, with the perfect game collegiate baseball league in upstate New York. With that rich baseball heritage and youthful enthusiasm, it is no wonder that the

Goldeyes signed him for the 2024 season.

On a typical broadcast day (following a night game), he rises at 9:30 am and walks for a couple hours through downtown, or The Forks, to prepare his material for the day. He gets to Blue Cross Park by noon. Trevor then checks the American Association stats and preps his game notes in point form. He organizes his pages of information about the pitchers, especially their highs and lows. Then it's prep time for the field positions and season stats (another four-for-four game for Max Murphy!). A half-hour before game time, Kevin hosts the pre-game show "Ride to the Ballpark", after which he's set to go on the first pitch.

Naturally, there has been a learning curve, as he balances his commentary with the time clock, the tempo of the different pitchers and the use of TrackMan. TrackMan is an innovative technology in professional baseball which provides – among other factors – pitch speed, home-run distances and exit velocity, the speed at which the ball leaves the bat.

There have been lifestyle adjustments for Trevor here in the 'Peg – road signs (kilometres vs miles), language (toque vs. beanie] and even food; Trevor had perogies for the first time! But one difference Trevor really emphasized was the friendliness of Winnipeggers.

He's a bit of a foodie and loves home cooking. (How can he not be with Sicilian heritage in his background?) He reminisced about the fresh seafood from Puget Sound or spaghetti sauce brewing for hours on the stove at home. On his rare off-days, he spends his time golfing, sightseeing and searching for new coffee shops.

Local original musical opens Rainbow's 2024 season

Song-and-dance spectacle celebrates Filipino culture

2024 marks the 70th anniversary season of Rainbow Stage. This year's first production is also the 150th musical to appear at Canada's largest and longest continually-running, professional, outdoor theatre company.

So, it makes sense that Rainbow has chosen to present a truly singular, song-and-dance spectacle for the whole family! Ma-Buhay (pronunciation: "Maw-BOO-High") is not only an original musical, created (book, music and lyrics) and directed by Winnipeg's own veteran Filipino artist Joseph Sevillo – it also features an all-Filipino cast and creative team. If that's not enough, Andrea Macasaet – the original Anne Bolyn from Broadway's "Six" – returns to her native Winnipeg to join the cast.

Joseph, who's performed in musical theatre across Canada for 27 years, says he's only had one opportunity to play a Filipino character. It was this that compelled him to create the musical he says is crucial for Filipinx artists to see, so they can hear their voices and believe they can achieve at the highest levels in the industry.

"Mabuhay" means "to live", but is commonly used as a greeting, such as "Welcome!". This encapsulates the overall goal of the musical – to welcome Filipinos and non-Filipinos alike, in experiencing a fun-filled show everyone can relate to.

Over six years in the making, the musical is about three young singers, who compete to win a reality-TV singing competition to improve the lives of their families. Through a series of extraordinary musical numbers, the story takes us from backstage to onstage, from past to present, and from Winnipeg to the Philippines, as we meet an assortment of wonderful characters and cheer on our favourite competitor.

Set in Winnipeg against the backdrop of a reality-TV singing competition (like The Voice or American Idol), Rainbow Stage will be transformed into a modern TV studio. Huge screens, live camera operators, unforgettable music and amazing dancers will fill the stage, and audiences will be treated to a heartwarming story that spans the entire emotional arc.

The number changed as husbands, nieces and nephews came and went, and when the stunning four-bedroom, two-bathroom, sprawling bungalow couldn't stretch enough to contain us all, the two tents erected in the front yard did the trick.

When the sheer number of people – which included visiting friends and neighbours – threatened to overwhelm us, we could always retreat to our bedrooms and read, or take a stroll on the beach for some AT (alone time). But we mostly revelled in the company of loved ones, lounging on the oversized front deck with a Ginzy (a flavourful combination of gin, tonic, lots of ice and a wedge of grapefruit – a drink we perfected over the past three summers), walking to town to explore (read: shop) the great selection of stores and boutiques, relaxing in the cottage over a game of Mah-Jong, Rummy, Cribbage or Taboo, or working on the seasonal puzzle set up permanently for the duration.

There are too many "favourite" beach routines to choose from, but if I had to, it would be our early-morning walks to Gimli's Starbuck's-like café, where we visited over Lattes and bagel BLTs: the scrumptious dinners made by each "couple" (these included an Olive-Garden-inspired Fettuccine Alfredo, with chicken or sausage, and an "all-you-can-eat" salad; an assortment of home-made, tortilla-based pizzas with a plethora of toppings, paired with Gimli's famous Europa Greek salad and mouth-watering Sex in a Pan for dessert; yummy chicken tacos - okay, they were from Costco, but you had to combine all the ingredients at home and besides, it's the thought that counts;) and the nights around the bonfire, where my nephew from New York (the "chosen" DJ for the week) provided a musical smorgasbord of tunes from every genre for our large, flame-enthralled circle.

Sunday, our last night there, happened to be the evening of the Tony Awards. For those of you who are not hardcore, musical-theatre fanatics – like my family (I've been a Broadway-inspired songwriter all my life and wrote/ produced a musical at the Winnipeg Fringe Festival last year; my sister, Marni, moved to the Big Apple in 1987 for an award-winning lyric-writing class, where she met her songwriter-husband, Peter, and gave birth to her now 21-year-old son, Shafer - a New-York-based singer/ actor; another sister, also a singer and resident of Toronto for 12 years, toured with the musical Les Miserables as merchandise manager, and, since her return to Winnipeg in 1981, has produced many local musicals and is now Winnipeg Studio Theatre's board president – and, if that's not enough, her daughter, a graduate of U of M's music program, is a budding stage manager whose partner is performing at Rainbow Stage this summer. Phew!!!)

Back to Sunday night... we all took part in Marni and Peter's annual online Tony Award pool (I think it was the first year my husband ever watched the Tony's!). We had to guess which show won best musical, best play, etc. in about 15 categories. To make it more difficult, we were pitted against participants from New York – friends of my sister and brother-in-law – many of whom had actually seen the nominated broadway productions.

Fortunately, we clueless Winnipeggers discussed the current favourites on Broadway with our New York family, so we could securely enter the contest with a little knowledge. It was all computerized and we made our guesses on our phones (thanks to my technologically trained/gifted sister, Marni). Peter took home the big prize (\$24... and bragging rights!) and, much to my surprise, I tied for 2nd with my nephew, Shafer!

It was a spectacular end to an even more spectacular week. But I think the best part was seeing my 90-year-old mother's glowing face as she "shepped nachos" (Yiddish for derived pleasure) from seeing all her family together in one place.



I've lived in Winnipeg all my life. I've worked in many professional roles, most notably as a journalist. Currently, I am an administrative assistant with the City of Winnipeg. My interests include cooking, reading about world history, ballroom/Latin dancing and, of course, music.

Music has been part of my life for as long as I can remember. I don't recall a time when the radio wasn't on in my parents' home. In 2000, I discovered nostalgia music while looking for an alternative to what my peers liked.
